Jason Fuller is the Managing Director and Global Development at Straife. When not in the political area, he spends his time bird hunting in South Texas, sailing the waters of his hometown Corpus Christi, traveling to off-the-beaten-path places like Machu Picchu in Peru, and trekking through Iraqi Kurdistan, skiing the Atlas Mountains of Morocco and bungee jumping off Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe – and all points in between.

He has been active at the University of Houston since he was a student in the early 1990s where as president of the Student Government Association, he served for the first time on the UH Alumni Association Board of Directors and again on the UHAA board in the early 2000s for seven years when he chaired the President's Council of the various constituent, special interest and college groups. He is a graduate of the UH College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences with a B.S. in Political Science and History.

A native of Corpus Christi, Jason holds a Bachelor's degree in Political Science and History from the University of Houston. He has volunteered with several area nonprofits, often on their boards of directors or chairing significant capital campaigns.
